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HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

Whether you want to spruce up your existing landscape or design a whole new one, you'll find that our plant selections create the perfect landscape palette. Here are some tips to help you get the most out of this book, and get started on a more colorful, more eye-catching landscape:

- Look for plants that provide a range of seasonal interest. We love roses and hydrangeas as much as you do, but the best landscapes incorporate a variety of plants that provide beauty throughout the year. Pick out some spring-blooming favorites, like forsythia, lilac, and Lenten rose, some summertime stunners like butterfly bush and Rose of Sharon, some fall fabulousness like viburnum and sweetspire, and of course, winter wonders like evergreens and winterberry holly.
- 2. Plant in multiples of odd numbers. Aside from the plants in the Large Plant and Specimens & Ornamentals sections, or unless you are planting a pair of shapely plants on either side of an entry, most things are best planted in groups of 3, 5, or 7. Take a look at some local landscapes you admire to see this principle in action.
- 3. Have trouble visualizing what the plants will look like around your home? Simply take a photo of your house, print it out in black and white, and roughly sketch in the shapes of the plants you like. It's an easy way to design your landscape and experiment with different possibilities.
- No landscape? No problem! Many plants can be grown in decorative containers on balconies, patios, porches, and decks.









Look for drawings of a home, like the one above, for hints on how the plants may be positioned in your landscape for maximum enjoyment.





THE RIGHT PLANT, IN THE RIGHT PLACE

Gardening can be hard enough when you consider the variable weather in the Chicagoland area, so don't make it more complex by putting your beautiful new plant into the wrong place in your garden. It's important to take the time to thoroughly research and choose plants that are well suited to the desired planting location. Plants that are sited properly will establish quickly, have a strong and healthy root system, and be healthier plants. Strong and healthy plants growing in their ideal conditions are better equipped to handle problems and are less likely to become diseased or be susceptible to insect damage.

So how do you ensure that you have the right plant in the right place? Evaluate the conditions for both your local environment but also research the actual planting location by taking the following into consideration:

 EXPOSURE – Do you have sun, shade, or a little bit of both? How much sun does the location receive and how is that defined? Use a light meter or observe your garden for a few days during the summer to determine how much direct sun your plants will see. Objects in the landscape such as fences and other plants may shade areas you think receive full sun. The typical exposure definitions are below:

FULL SUN - (6) or more hours of direct sun
PART SUN - (4-6) hours of direct sun per day, including some afternoon sun
PART SHADE - (4-6) hours of direct sun per day, mostly before mid-day
SHADE - Less than (4) hours of direct sun, no afternoon sun
Using plants that are happiest with the amount of sun your garden receives is the first step to ensure success.

- 2. WATER Is your soil wet, dry, or normal? When testing the soil in the desired planting location, make sure to dig down to evaluate the soil. Dry mulch or soil at the surface can be deceiving! How the soil drains is also important. Dig a test hole 12" deep and fill it with water. If it takes more than 15 minutes to drain you may have drainage problems.
- 3. SURROUNDINGS Are there structures in the garden that might impact your plants? A brick wall might reflect heat making the garden hotter than similar gardens located elsewhere. Or a wall might provide a windbreak creating the perfect location for sensitive plants. If your water source is far away, planting items that need a lot of water might not be the best plan.
- 4. HARDINESS ZONE How cold can your plants go? Not all plants are created equal and some can't survive our cold Chicagoland winters. Be sure to check the hardiness zone of your potential new plant to be sure it will survive in our climate. Most of our area is considered Zone 5, meaning that our average annual minimum temperatures don't go below -20F.
- 5. PLANT HABIT Upright, mounding, spreading? What is the size and shape of the garden area you are trying to fill? Is it tall and skinny, low and wide, or something in between? Selecting plants that will fit into the open space, at maturity, will make maintaining your garden a whole lot simpler. Be patient, allow your plants to grow and fill in, and you will save yourself a lot of frustration.
- 6. MAINTENANCE How much time do you want to spend tending to your garden? If you are looking to devote a lot of time to maintaining your garden, high-maintenance plants will keep you on your toes all season long, but there are plenty of low-maintenance options available. It's always a good choice to place higher maintenance plants in locations that you will see often to remind you of when they need some love.



HOW TO READ OUR PLANT TAG





THE BASICS: A PLANTING GUIDE


- 1. Dig the hole 2-3 times as wide as the diameter of the rootball.
- 2. Do not plant too deep! The hole should be the current depth or slightly less than the soil level in the container or burlap ball. Depending on the soil type plant as deep (or slightly less deep in poorly drained soils) as the height of the rootball.
- **3.** Mix no more than 10% of the backfill with compost, peat moss, or other organic matter to help improve soil quality Blend well!
- **4.** Occasionally, staking may be required when planting on a slope, in sandy soil, or a windy, exposed location.
- 5. Add a 2-3" layer of mulch around the plant (never against the base of the trunk or over the trunk flare). This helps reduce water stress by retaining moisture, regulating soil temperature in winter, and controlling competition from grass and weeds.
- 6. Newly planted trees, shrubs, and perennials need special water attention for at least the first full year after planting. Once established supplemental watering may be needed in periods of drought.

Lurvey Pro Tip: Learn the type of soil in your yard and how it drains or holds water during each season. If your home was constructed in the past five years, your soil may be heavy, compacted clay that doesn't drain and watering times and frequency should be reduced by half. Dig a test hole 12" deep and wide and fill with water. If the hole doesn't fully drain within 15 minutes, you may have drainage problems that can lead to root rot.

THE BASICS: WATERING TIPS

- Water stress can result from either too much or too little water and is the #1 cause of poor plant growth and even death. Keep in mind that symptoms of either type of water stress can look very similar.
- The type of newly planted trees, shrubs, or perennials plus the time of year and temperature are all factors in determining how much water each plant will need. Learn the type of soil in your yard, how it drains or holds water.
- Water the soil at the base of the plant where the roots are. Avoid using overhead sprinklers, except when watering lawns. Soaker hoses or spot irrigation is most effective, efficient, and economical.
- **4.** Avoid shallow-rooted, wilt-prone plants and mildewed foliage with these TWO RULES when watering:
 - **a.** Water slowly and deeply rather than frequently and shallowly, to encourage deep root growth. Allow soil to dry slightly between watering, this will encourage roots to reach for water.
 - **b.** Water the ground, not the air or leaves. Very dry soil is slow to take up water so you may need to water one plant, go to the next and come back to the previous to be sure the water is able to soak into the ground.

Lurvey Pro Tip: Most trees and shrubs should receive 1" to 1.5" (5-10 gallons) of water per week during the growing season. If the plants do not receive rain, manual watering should be provided. A typical garden hose on low to medium pressure, on shower setting, will take about 5 minutes to produce 10 gallons of water.

WATERING VOLUME & FREQUENCY (PRIORITY: VOLUME OVER FREQUENCY)

TREES & SHRUBS:

AMOUNT OF EACH WATERING: 2-3 minutes with the hose on low to medium shower at the base or 1-1.5 hours with a soaker hose

FIRST MONTH: Check soil moisture daily by hand or moisture meter (water 2-3 times per week)

FIRST & SECOND SEASON: 1 time per week for the remainder of the growing season

PERENNIALS:

AMOUNT OF EACH WATERING: 30 seconds to 1 minute with the hose on a low shower at the base or 30-45 minutes with a soaker hose

FIRST TWO WEEKS: Check soil moisture daily (water 3-4 times per week)

FIRST & SECOND SEASON: 1 time per week for the remainder of the growing season

REMEMBER TO GIVE ALL PLANTS A DEEP WATERING JUST PRIOR TO THE GROUND FREEZING (around Thanksgiving), REGARDLESS OF THEIR AGE!



Lurvey Pro Tip:

It is very important for your new plantings to be watered regularly. However, the type of soil and the weather conditions should determine how frequently and how much you water. Never water automatically or without first checking the soil to determine if watering is needed. To do this, use a trowel to test the moisture of your soil about 4-6 inches deep. If you find it is dry or only slightly damp, the plant should be watered. Sandy soils generally will need to be watered more frequently than clay soils.





BUTTERFLY GARDEN

Plants that attract and will increase the number and variety of butterflies that visit your garden.

Hydrangeas are absolutely one of the most beautiful and easiest to grow plants! There's just one catch, you must know which type you are growing! There are 6 main types of hydrangea and they all need slightly different care.







Mountain hydrangeas stay dormant longer and bloom later than bigleafs, so they are far less susceptible to temperature extremes killing off tender buds. They also have another advantage in their smaller leaves. With their smaller leaves, mountain hydrangeas are more tolerant of harsh sun and heat, making them a better fit for warmer months.





HEDGES LIVING ARCHITECTURE FOR THE LANDSCAPE

Hedges are incredibly hardworking plants in the garden, serving the important purpose of providing privacy and defining spaces. This is especially crucial in areas where neighbors are close by. However, large spaces can also make use of hedges to separate different areas or make a bold statement.

Before we talk about plant options, let's clear up some hedge myths. First, hedges don't always have to be evergreen. Plants like 'Limelight' hydrangeas, forsythia, and viburnum can create beautiful flowering hedges. Second, hedges don't have to be perfectly trimmed. Some of the most attractive ones are left to grow naturally without pruning. Lastly, a hedge doesn't have to surround the entire yard. Just three or more shrubs from the following pages can be strategically placed to create a useful and effective hedge.





FORSYTHIA (F. hybrid)





LOW HEDGE & EDGING SMALL STRUCTURES CAN GENERATE BIG DESIGN FEATURES



Low hedges are a refined way to define space in a landscape. They are smaller than regular privacy hedges and are commonly used to separate different areas like planting beds, patios, and other elements in the landscape. Unlike large screens or fences, low hedges offer a softer visual barrier between backyards. On the other hand, edging plants are smaller in size and are typically used to prevent turfgrass from spreading into surrounding plantings. They also help mark boundaries between paths, planting beds, and other landscape features. Both low hedges and edging plants create clean lines that bring consistency and simplicity to a well-designed landscape. The shrub suggestions on the following pages are all under 5 feet tall and can either stand alone or be mixed with other plants.

Lurvey Pro Tip:

Protect your boxwood from drying winter winds. Damage typically occurs in our area when the ground is frozen and winter winds blow across the foliage. Unfortunately, this causes leaves to transpire moisture and not be able to replenish water from the frozen ground. You can protect evergreens by giving them a deep watering just prior to the ground freezing and either wrapping them in burlap or using an anti-transpirant spray in late fall.

Did you know?

Botanically speaking, all azaleas are Rhododendron, but not all Rhododendron are azaleas. The plants that we consider proper rhododendrons have large, leathery evergreen foliage and flowers typically borne in orb-like clusters. Azaleas are typically smaller in overall size, foliage may be evergreen or deciduous and have loose clusters of 3-5 flowers.
